Episode 6: Federalism, Party Politics and Environment

Overview: Using the example of carbon pricing, Dr. Kathryn Harrison (UBC) and Dr. Andrea Olive (Toronto) walk us through the complex factors influencing environmental policy-making in the Canadian Federation.

Key Takeaways

- "I think of federalism as a really complicated machine, and it's got all kinds of different levers and in the Canadian case, it's got 11 different steering wheels, 10 provinces and the federal government" (Dr. Harrison, 5:18-5:58).
- The landscape of federalism has led to complicated outcomes in carbon pricing, with provincial legislation changing over time due to changing political, social, cultural, and economic contexts.
- The environmental policy process features different actors with unique interests and different levels of power. For example, industry has considerable resources and access to decision-makers through a powerful lobby. At the same time, there is a strong and growing climate movement increasingly contesting power.

Discussion Questions

- 1. Building on the examples provided by Dr. Olive and Dr. Harrison, how would you characterize the dynamic between different levels of government on climate policy today?
- 2. How do you see *your* role as an individual in shaping environmental policy in Canada today (i.e. informed citizen; activist; influencer; good Samaritan; strategic voter; political actor; campaign funder; other)?
- 3. How would you describe the power of collective action through youth-led climate strikes and other movements in Canada? How has the youth climate movement changed the climate politics discussion?
- 4. How do you think the political context in Canada both nationally and regionally, as discussed by Dr. Harrison and Dr. Olive, has impacted how well Canada's environment is protected?
