# **Episode 11: Growth, Degrowth, Agrowth.**

Overview: What is the relationship between economic growth and the environment - and why is there so much debate about such a seemingly simple question? In this episode we hear Dr. Susan Paulson (University of Florida) and Dr. Bengi Akbulut (Concordia University) share their answers to this question, and more!

# **Key Takeaways**

- There is a difference between economic growth and growth of material throughput, yet for much of recent history the two have been "intimately married, deeply inseparable" (Dr. Paulson, 02:23-03:07). This relationship is contributing to recent debates on the benefits or drawbacks of growth and its relationship with the environment.
- Degrowth scholars and advocates seek a repudiation of the ideology of "growthism".
   They seek a world of abundance for the things we need, for everyone, and a measured reduction in all those material things that are not necessary globally. "There's no degrowth without addressing injustices" (Dr. Akbulut, 00:00-00:24).
- Capitalist growth has been rooted in inequality, including colonialism, racism, and other points of exploitation, that have benefited some countries and people over others.
- Addressing the climate crisis will require fundamental changes in values at the
  individual, community, and global level to decrease the use of materials, change cultural
  relations, achieve social justice, and ground our development policies in the care of
  people and the planet.

#### **Discussion Questions**

- How firmly entrenched is "growthism" within your own understanding of progress?
- Do you agree that growth presents a problem for the environment, or do you see potential for "green growth"?
- What do you think are the key obstacles to addressing the growth within your political community? Would 'degrowth' offer a viable political alternative to contemporary capitalist relations?
- Do you believe the degrowth premise that growth in the Global North stems from extraction and exploitation in the Global South? Why or why not?
